



#### Living the Promise of Doing Things Differently

The IGAD Drought Disaster Resilience and Sustainability Initiative (IDDRSI) was launched in 2011, as a collective decision at the highest level of Member States, development partners and other stakeholders in the Horn of Africa region. IDDRSI is a prescription for investing in sustainable development through optimizing the productivity of the region's resources and building the resilience of its communities to the region's environmental and socio-economic shocks. The need to address the vulnerabilities and challenges of drought-prone communities, including poverty, food insecurity and environmental degradation, is not new. However, what is new, is to do so: (a) in a concerted, coordinated and harmonized manner throughout the countries of the IGAD region, as a collective undertaking, with everyone reading from the same page; and (b) aiming to build the resilience of the affected communities, thus targeting the capacities of vulnerable individuals and ensuring that the beneficiaries are enabled to sustainably cope with drought and related shocks. This method of work is widely acknowledged to be a new way of doing things: Doing things differently.

In the past, the approaches used or advocated by governments, development partners and humanitarian agencies, to respond to drought and related emergencies, were in the form of reactive humanitarian relief interventions, usually based on the action of individual Member States or international agencies. IDDRSI advocates a coherent architecture of international action that involves the enhanced coordination of actors in Member States and the strategic linkages between humanitarian relief interventions and development initiatives. Built around the principle of identifying and executing holistic resilience-enhancing interventions, IDDRSI exercises national action backed by regional thinking; and provides an effective blue print for collective sustainable development. The actions on all fronts are guided by the same regional strategy that seeks to build resilience, using the same framework that is interpreted to reflect the specific needs and circumstances in each country or local area. Further, IGAD Member States and their Development Partners agreed to form the IDDRSI Platform, an effective mechanism by which the implementation of IDDRSI is coordinated, which brings together all partners and stakeholders and provides the modalities through which the region's priorities and options for achieving the objectives of the drought resilience initiative are collectively discussed.

IDDRSI and its objective of ending drought emergencies, building drought resilience and achieving growth and sustainable development is the IGAD region's most versatile development paradigm so far designed that has assumed transformational significance and got all actors working together. It has evolved into an integrative mobilization force that serves as an effective rallying point to drive the region's development agenda, providing a common framework through which the key drivers that contribute to the instabilities and vulnerabilities in the region can be analyzed, understood and addressed.

Considerable progress has been made: the establishment of IDDRSI coordination structures; interpretation of the IDDRSI Strategy into CPPs and RPP; and the translation of CPPs and RPP into investments plans for resource mobilization to secure soft loans and grants from various sources, notably the African Development Bank, the World Bank, Germany, European Union, USAID, Islamic Development Bank, Denmark and other development partners. It is gratifying to note the huge positive response and goodwill expressed by the affected countries and their development partners - to support the implementation of IDDRSI, in spite of the global economic down trend and alleged donor fatigue. It appears that the problem of drought emergencies is finally receiving the attention it demands and is getting effectively addressed. The region has lived its pledge of doing things differently.


- September 2011 Summit to launch IDDRSI, Nairobi
- June 2012 IDDRI Platform Coordination Unit Established
- July 2012 First IDDRSI Platform Steering Committee Meeting held
- September 2012 The establishment of national IDDRSI Platform coordination structures

at a Glance

- October 2012 Support by AfDB to IGAD Secretariat for IDDRSI Coordination and DRSLP approved by the African Development Bank, committing USD300 million
- February 2013 IDDRSI Strategy (2013 2017) approved and launched
- April July 2013 Preparation of IDDRSI Country Programming Frameworks (CPPs and RPP)
- Translation of CPPs and RPP into investment plans and project proposals for resource mobilization, including flagship projects DRSLP, RPLRP, etc starts
- March 2014 Second Resilience Summit of the Heads of State Government took place in Entebbe, Uganda: Action on IDDRSI Re-affirmed.
- January 2015 Implementation of the World Bank funded RPLRP started in 3 countries (Ethiopia, Kenya and Uganda)
- October 2015, the EU Council adopted the Regional Action Plan for the Horn of Africa andagreed to give priority to the following five groups of actions in the period 2015- 2020, creating a new focus on the special aspects of implementing in cross-border areas
- November 2015 "Regional Fund for Strengthening Drought Resilience in the Horn of Africa" approved by Germany and has agreed to commit up to 50 million Euro
- January 2018 The Mi-term Review of the IDDRSI Strategy implementation undertaken
- May 2018 Process of refining the IDDRSI Programming Frameworks began
- June 2019 New IDDRSI Programming frameworks prepared
- October 2018 Support from Sweden secured for IDDRSI Coordination
