

Project Dates: November 1, 2021, to October 31, 2026


Funding: USAID

- Local organizations as key implementing entities at Cluster level
- Leverage on the IGAD convening power

Kenya: Turkana, West Pokot, Marsabit and Mandera counties

Uganda: Amudat, Moroto, Kotido and Kaabong districts

South Sudan: Kapoeta East, Kapoeta South, Kapoeta North and Budi

Ethiopia: Moyale, Dire, Dilo, Mio, Teltele, Dasenach, Hamer, Nyangatom, Filtu, Dollo Ado, Dollo Bay Chereti

Somalia: Dollow, Beled Hawa, Eel Wak





CBCR will work through local development partners to drive resilience programming



(1) Build capacity for locally led and managed programming



(2) strengthening <u>social cohesion</u> as a foundation for resilience programming



(3) expanding conflict-sensitive and inclusive <u>livelihoods and</u> <u>employment opportunities</u>



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
- (4) improving the management and equitable sharing of <u>natural</u> <u>resources</u> in cross-border areas
- (5) enhancing <u>collaboration and learning</u> across all activities





DEVELOPMENT HYPOTHESIS AND RESULTS FRAMEWORK

If the implementation of activities is locally-led, meaning designed, driven/managed and owned by local communities, and **if** interventions strengthen social cohesion as a foundation to expanding livelihood and employment opportunities, to promoting conflict-sensitive management and sharing of natural resources, and to enhancing platforms for collaborating and learning **then** cross-border community resilience in the challenging context of the borderlands of Karamoja, Moyale and Mandera can be advanced.





CURRENT STATUS

- CBCR aims to reach 21,000 people who will be direct beneficiaries in the program, at least 50 Local development organizations with grants and 21 coordination bodies and groups in the 3 cluster regions.
- CBCR has already initiated mapping of Local Development Organizations (LDOs) and key stakeholders
- Working closely with IGAD resilience team to introduce the Activity to different offices and USAID Bilateral missions of Kenya, Uganda, Ethiopia, SSudan and Somalia
- CBCR issued a request for research assessments for 3 clusters for work over the next three months in the areas of Conflict and Climate, Labour Market Assessments, Political Economy Analysis, Social Network Analysis and Natural Resources Assessment





CURRENT STATUS

- CBCR to award up to 12 Drought Recovery grants in the 2 clusters that will focus on protecting livelihood gains, supporting women businesses, sustaining local markets, mediating access of natural resources across the borders, and social cohesion protection and promotion
- CBCR to award grants to LDOs and initiate co-creation activities later in 2022





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
